In the Indian context, education has been a fundamental right under Article 21A of the Constitution of India. Which grants free and compulsory education to children between the ages of 6-14 years. The constitutional recognition reflects the importance of education in promoting equality, increasing employment opportunities, and encouraging active participation in democratic governance. It enables young people to make informed decisions, respect diversity, and uphold constitutional values. Therefore, the concept of education is comprehensive and dynamic. It is not limited to classroom instruction but encompasses the holistic development of individuals and compassionate human beings. In today's rapidly changing world, education remains the key to personal growth, social transformation and sustainable national development.

Article 19(1)(a) guarantees freedom of speech and expression, allowing young people to express their ideas responsibly, while Article 51A encourages every citizen to develop scientific temper, humanism, and the spirit of inquiry. These constitutional provisions strengthen the relationship between education and youth culture by promoting equality, knowledge, responsibility, and democratic values.

CHALLENGES FACED BY YOUTH IN EDUCATION

Education is essential for the growth and development of young people. However, despite significant improvements in the education system, many students continue to face challenges that affect their academic performance, mental well-being, and future opportunities.¹⁵ These challenges arise due to social, economic, technological, and personal factors. Addressing these issues is necessary to ensure that every young person receives quality education and has an equal opportunity to succeed.

Financial and Economic Challenges: Many students come from economically weaker families and struggle to afford school or college fees, books, transportation, digital devices, and other educational expenses. Financial difficulties often force students to take part-time jobs or even discontinue their education. Although scholarships and government schemes provide support, many deserving students still face barriers in accessing quality education.

Unequal Access to Quality Education: The quality of education is not the same in every region. Students living in rural and remote areas often face a shortage of qualified teachers, proper classrooms, libraries, laboratories, and internet facilities. This creates inequality in learning opportunities and affects the overall development of young people. Equal access to quality education is essential for achieving social justice and national progress.

Academic Pressure and Competition: Modern education has become highly competitive. Students are expected to perform well in examinations, secure high grades, and prepare for competitive entrance tests. This constant pressure often leads to stress, anxiety, fear of failure, and low self-confidence. In some cases, excessive academic pressure may negatively affect students' mental and physical health.

Mental Health Issues: Mental health has become a major concern among young people.¹⁶ Anxiety, depression, loneliness, emotional stress, and low self-esteem are increasingly common among students. Academic expectations, family pressure, social comparison, and uncertainty about future careers often contribute to these problems.¹⁷ Educational institutions should provide counselling services, mental health awareness programmes, and a supportive learning environment to help students cope with these challenges.

Digital Divide and Misuse of Technology: Technology has made education more accessible, but not every student has equal access to digital resources. Many students lack smartphones, laptops, stable internet connections, or digital skills. At the same time, excessive use of social media, online gaming, and digital entertainment can distract students from their studies. Cyberbullying, misinformation, and privacy concerns have also become serious challenges in the digital learning environment.

Unemployment and Skill Gap: Many young people face difficulty in finding employment even after completing their education. One of the major reasons is the gap between academic learning and industry requirements. Employers often expect practical skills, communication abilities, digital literacy, and problem-solving skills, while many students receive mostly theoretical education. Therefore, educational institutions should focus more on skill development, internships, vocational training, and career guidance.

Gender Inequality and Social Discrimination: Although access to education has improved, many young people still face discrimination based on gender, caste, religion, disability, or economic background. In some communities, girls are denied equal educational opportunities due to social customs, early marriage, or financial constraints. Such discrimination prevents many talented students from achieving their full potential and weakens the principles of equality and justice.

Peer Pressure and Social Influence: Young people are often influenced by friends, social media, and popular culture. Peer pressure may encourage unhealthy competition, substance abuse, irresponsible behaviour, or excessive dependence on social media. Students may also

Lack of Career Guidance: Many students are uncertain about choosing the right career path because they do not receive proper counselling or information about available opportunities. This confusion may lead to wrong career choices, dissatisfaction, and unemployment. Educational institutions should provide career counselling, skill assessment, and exposure to different professions so that students can make informed decisions.

Constitutional Perspective: The Constitution of India recognises education as a fundamental right and an essential means of achieving equality and social justice. Article 21A guarantees the Right to Education for children between the ages of six and fourteen years. Articles 14 and 15 ensure equality before the law and prohibit discrimination in educational opportunities. Article 46 directs the State to promote the educational and economic interests of weaker sections of society. These constitutional provisions emphasise the responsibility of the State to remove barriers and ensure inclusive, quality education for every child and young person.

Despite remarkable progress in the field of education, many young people continue to face challenges related to financial difficulties, unequal access to quality education, academic pressure, mental health, unemployment, technological inequalities, and social discrimination. Addressing these challenges requires the combined efforts of the government, educational institutions, families, and society. By ensuring inclusive, accessible, and quality education, India can empower its youth and prepare them to contribute effectively to the country's social, economic, and democratic development.

CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS RELATING TO EDUCATION AND YOUTH

The Constitution of India recognises education as one of the most important tools for individual development and national progress.¹⁸ It guarantees equal opportunities in education and promotes the welfare of children and young people through Fundamental Rights, Directive Principles of State Policy, and Fundamental Duties. These constitutional provisions aim to create an educated, responsible, and socially aware youth who can contribute to the growth of the nation.

Article 14 – Right to Equality: Article 14 guarantees equality before the law and equal protection of the laws to every person. In the field of education, this Article ensures that every student is treated equally and receives equal protection without any arbitrary discrimination. It forms the foundation of equal educational opportunities in India.¹⁹

Article 15 – Prohibition of Discrimination: Article 15 prohibits discrimination on the grounds of religion, race, caste, sex, or place of birth. It also allows the State to make special provisions for women, children, socially and educationally backward classes, Scheduled Castes (SCs), and Scheduled Tribes (STs). This provision helps promote inclusive education and equal access to educational institutions.

Article 21A – Right to Education: Article 21A, inserted by the 86th Constitutional Amendment Act, 2002, guarantees free and compulsory education to all children between the ages of 6 and 14 years. This right is implemented through the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 (RTE Act). It reflects the commitment of the Constitution to ensure that every child receives basic education regardless of economic or social background.

Article 19(1)(a) – Freedom of Speech and Expression: Article 19(1)(a) guarantees the freedom of speech and expression. Educational institutions encourage students to express their opinions, participate in debates, conduct research, and discuss social, legal, and political issues. This freedom promotes critical thinking, creativity, and democratic participation among young people.

Article 21 – Right to Life and Personal Liberty: Article 21 guarantees the right to life and personal liberty. The Supreme Court has interpreted this Article broadly to include the right to live with dignity, and education is considered an essential part of a dignified life. Education enables individuals to improve their quality of life and fully enjoy other constitutional rights.

Article 39(f) – Protection of Children: Article 39(f), which is part of the Directive Principles of State Policy, directs the State to ensure that children are given opportunities to develop in a healthy and dignified manner. It also aims to protect children against exploitation, neglect, and moral or material abandonment. Education plays an important role in achieving these objectives.

Article 45 – Early Childhood Care and Education: Article 45 directs the State to provide early childhood care and education for children below the age of six years. Early education is essential for the physical, emotional, and intellectual development of children and lays the foundation for lifelong learning.

Article 46 – Promotion of Educational Interests of Weaker Sections: Article 46 directs the State to promote the educational and economic interests of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, and other weaker sections of society. It also requires the State to protect them from social injustice and exploitation. This provision aims to reduce educational inequality and ensure equal opportunities for all.

Article 51A(k) – Fundamental Duty of Parents: Article 51A(k) makes it the fundamental duty of every parent or guardian to provide opportunities for education to their child or ward between the ages of 6 and 14 years. This provision emphasises that ensuring education is not only the responsibility of the government but also of parents and guardians.

Importance of Constitutional Provisions: These constitutional provisions ensure that education is accessible, inclusive, and based on the principles of equality, justice, and human dignity. They protect the educational rights of children and youth, promote social justice, and encourage the development of responsible and informed citizens. Together, these Articles strengthen India's commitment to building an educated society capable of contributing to democratic governance and national development.

The Constitution of India provides a strong legal framework for promoting education and protecting the interests of children and youth. Through Fundamental Rights, Directive Principles of State Policy, and Fundamental Duties, it guarantees equal educational opportunities and encourages the holistic development of every individual. These constitutional safeguards ensure that education remains a powerful instrument for achieving social justice, equality, and national progress.

IMPORTANT CASE LAWS RELATING TO EDUCATION AND YOUTH

The Supreme Court of India has played a significant role in protecting the right to education and ensuring equal educational opportunities. Through various landmark judgments, the Court has interpreted constitutional provisions and strengthened the rights of children and young people. Some of the most important case laws are discussed below.

Mohini Jain v. State of Karnataka (1992) –

Facts: The Government of Karnataka allowed private medical colleges to charge very high capitation fees from students who were not residents of the State. Mohini Jain challenged this policy, arguing that it violated the constitutional principles of equality and the right to education.²⁰

Judgment: The Supreme Court held that the Right to Education is an essential part of the Right to Life under Article 21 of the Constitution. The Court observed that education is necessary for living a life with dignity and that charging excessive capitation fees made education inaccessible to many deserving students.

Significance:

- Recognised education as a part of the Right to Life.
- Emphasised that education should not become a privilege only for the wealthy.
- Laid the foundation for later recognition of education as a Fundamental Right.

Unni Krishnan, J.P. v. State of Andhra Pradesh (1993) –

Facts: The constitutional validity of the admission process and fee structure in private professional educational institutions was challenged before the Supreme Court.²¹

Judgment: The Court held that every child has a fundamental right to free education up to the age of 14 years under Article 21. Beyond this age, the State should provide educational opportunities according to its economic capacity and development.

Significance:

- Clarified the scope of the Right to Education.
- Became the basis for the 86th Constitutional Amendment Act, 2002, which introduced Article 21A.
- Strengthened the responsibility of the State to provide elementary education.

Society for Unaided Private Schools of Rajasthan v. Union of India (2012) –

Facts: Several private schools challenged the constitutional validity of the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009, particularly the provision requiring private schools to reserve 25% of seats for children from economically weaker sections and disadvantaged groups.²²

Judgment: The Supreme Court upheld the constitutional validity of the RTE Act and ruled that the reservation of 25% seats in private unaided schools was constitutional (except for certain minority educational institutions).

Significance:

- Strengthened the implementation of Article 21A.
- Promoted equal educational opportunities.
- Encouraged inclusive education by ensuring access for disadvantaged children.

Avinash Mehrotra v. Union of India (2009) –

Facts: The case arose after a tragic fire accident in a school, raising serious concerns about the safety of school buildings and infrastructure.²³

Judgment: The Supreme Court directed all schools to follow proper fire safety measures and maintain safe infrastructure for students. The Court held that providing a safe learning environment is an essential part of the right to education.

Significance:

- Recognised student safety as an important aspect of education.
- Directed governments and schools to improve safety standards.
- Strengthened the protection of children's rights in educational institutions.

Overall Importance of These Judgments: These landmark decisions have significantly strengthened the constitutional protection of education in India. Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education (RTE) Act 2009: The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 was enacted to implement "Article 21A of the Constitution".²⁴ The Act guarantees free and compulsory education to every child between the ages of 6 and 14 years. It also lays down standards for schools, teacher qualifications, infrastructure, and student welfare. One of its important provisions requires private unaided schools to reserve 25% of seats for children belonging to economically weaker sections and disadvantaged groups.

Skill India Mission: The Skill India Mission, launched in 2015, aims to equip young people with practical and employment-oriented skills. Through vocational training, technical

PM eVIDYA: PM eVIDYA is a digital education initiative launched to ensure uninterrupted learning through online and television-based education.²⁷ It includes educational television channels, digital content, online classes, and e-learning resources. This programme has helped students continue their education even when physical schools were closed.

SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds): SWAYAM is the Government of India's online learning platform that provides free courses from schools to universities.²⁸ Students can learn from experienced teachers and experts through video lectures, study materials, assignments, and online assessments. It promotes lifelong learning and improves access to quality education across the country.

National Digital Library of India (NDLI): The National Digital Library of India provides free access to millions of books, journals, research papers, educational videos, and learning materials.²⁹ It helps students, teachers, and researchers access reliable academic resources anytime and from anywhere, thereby promoting self-learning and research.

Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao: The Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao scheme aims to improve the status of girls by promoting education, preventing gender discrimination, and encouraging equal opportunities.³⁰ It creates awareness about the importance of educating girls and supports their participation in schools and higher education.

Strengthen Career Guidance: Every school and college should provide career counselling and guidance to help students choose suitable career paths according to their interests, abilities, and future opportunities. Career guidance can reduce confusion and improve employability.

Encourage Active Youth Participation: Young people should be encouraged to participate in social service, environmental protection, legal awareness campaigns, cultural programmes,

and democratic activities. Such participation develops leadership qualities, social responsibility, and a sense of national commitment.

Promote Collaboration Between Families, Schools, and Society: Parents, teachers, educational institutions, and society should work together to create a positive learning environment. Regular communication, guidance, and support can help young people overcome challenges and develop into responsible, confident, and ethical citizens.
